Safety Rules: Collection of Discarded Syringes and Sharps

### **Purpose**

This document details the safe collection of discarded syringes or sharps

## Scope

This document applies to all workers who come in contact with discarded syringes or sharps.

#### Information

Sharps include:

- Hypodermic needles
- Lancets (2 edged scalpel)
- Intra-venous lines
- Scalpel blades
- Broken glass
- Knives
- Any other sharp item which has the potential to break skin or mucous membranes.

Such injuries caused by sharps are commonly known as Needle Stick Injuries.

#### Rules

Workers may be required to pick up discarded syringes and therefore the following safe handling procedures must be followed:

- 1. PPE to be worn: Footwear enclosing the foot to ankle height with sturdy soles sturdy gloves that are puncture resistant.
- 2. Syringes should be collected with tongs.
- 3. Cuts and sores on hands must be covered with a waterproof dressing.
- 4. Only place discarded syringes in approved disposal containers (refer below).
- 5. Take the Sharps Container to the needle **NOT** the needle to the container.
- 6. Don't attempt to bend, break or recap needles.
- 7. Don't overfill Sharps Containers.
- 8. Do not forage for sharps use tongs to uncover partially hidden sharps.
- 9. Full containers (after lid securely closed) are to be placed in your local drop off bins, contact your local council for locations.

### Approved Containers for carrying used Sharps must be: -

- Puncture resistant, waterproof and leak proof.
- Designed so that the opening is wide enough to allow Sharps to be dropped into the container by a single hand operation.
- Designed so that the opening is small enough to prevent insertion of a person's hand.

- Clearly labelled with black lettering on yellow background with the biohazard symbol printed on the container.
- Have a lid that can be securely sealed before disposal.

## **Transporting Syringes**

- Sharps must be placed in containers that are securely sealed during transport. Used syringes must not be transported loose or in bags.
- Sharps containers with used syringes in them are to be conveyed in sedan boots, tray area of utes or twin cabs and behind special rear seat barriers of station wagons.
- Sharps should be transported the shortest practical route and removed from the vehicle at the earliest chance.
